ANTI-FOREIGN WAVE RISING IN SHANGHAI

Heavy Guards on Duty—Nanking Refugees Arrive.

Washington, D. C., March 26 (UP)—Alarmed by spreading anti-foreign activity in China, President Coolidge today ordered more than 1500 more American marines sent to the war zone to protect 1,000 of United States nationals potentially menaced there.

The Henderson, now at Corinto, Nicaragua, after carrying 1200 marines to protect American lives and property in Nicaragua, will arrive in San Diego in about ten days. In that time the marines ready for service will be mobilized at some eastern points from their stations and will be moved across the continent by train.

Washington, D. C., March 26 (UP)—All foreigners have been removed from the rioting city of Nanking, Secretary of the Navy William D. Clegg announced today. One American has been killed.

Shanghai March 26 (UP)—Marshal Chiang-kai-shek, Cantonese commander in chief, today defied the world to suppress China and pledged himself to cancellation of the so-called unequal treaties under which foreigners in China have enjoyed special privileges.

Shanghai, March 26 (UP)—Anti-foreign feeling, growing in Shanghai today as resentment against bombardment of Nanking by the British and gunboats, was fanned by native agitators. Heavy guards were on duty at all outposts of the foreign settlements and armed patrols circulated between the posts.

The steamer Kungwo Wenchow, carrying 200 foreigners, mostly Americans, from Nanking and other dangerous interior points arrived here today. Hundreds of Americans and British gathered at the dock to meet the boat, hoping for word from friends and relatives in the interior.

Many at the docks were wives of men who remained at their posts in Nanking and elsewhere after sending their families to the relative safety of Shanghai. A few found familiar faces on the boat, but most of them turned away from the deck with no definite word of the fate of their loved ones.

Without military escort scores of Europeans and Americans, who had been trapped in the riotous city for 48 hours, terrorized by the inflated natives, arrived at the docks Friday night and Saturday morning and embarked on destroyers for Shanghai.

The strong attitude of the commanders of the British, American and Japanese ships was given credit for this successful evacuation of foreigners who were not molested as they made their way to the protection of ships and guns.

Miss Anna E. Moffett, professor of Nanking, university, was carried to the dock with two bullet wounds in her body. Her condition was reported critical. A message from Admiral Hough at Nanking to Washington said Miss Moffett was wanted shot twice by nationalist soldiers. Miss Moffett is the daughter of Col. W. P. Moffett of Madison, Wis., and a sister of E. B. Moffett, St. Paul.

Marine Plumley, guard at the United States consulate, was wounded while protecting a party of Americans fleeing to the safety of Soongyi hill.

Shanghai, March 26 (UP)—Two French priests today were reported to have been murdered by the Chinese at Nanking and the French were reported to be evacuating Nanking aboard a gunboat which was proceeding to Shanghai.
