Four Waves Start Training At College For Sailorettes

Northampton, Mass., Aug. 28 (UP)—The first four Waves arrived today as the vanguard of 129 who will come here during the next 10 days for training as officers at the Smith college school for sailorettes.

First to arrive—and receive the official title of number one Wave—was 33-year-old Elinor Denton Rich of Quincy. As she stepped smilingly from the train, she was engulfed by a welcoming committee that included 15 naval officers, and 24 photographers and newsmen.

Lieutenant Paul Ellis, a member of the staff which will train the Waves, extended an official greeting and several of the group escorted Miss Rich to the commandant's office in Capen house on the campus.

A few minutes later, a second train arrived with Frances Rich of Los Angeles—not related to the number one Wave but a daughter of film actress Irene Rich; Georgia Berner, 28, of New York, and Betty Evans, 33, Council Bluffs, Ia.

Frances Rich, who was returning to her alma mater, stepped gingerly along the station platform, explaining: "These low-heeled oxfords I bought to drill in are killing my feet."

Miss Rich, who was sculptor of the army-navy nurse statue in Arlington National cemetery, came here from Burbank, Cal., where she has been working as an illustrator in an airplane factory.

The newly-arrived Waves were quickly initiated into the preliminaries of navy discipline. After a brief priming period, they received various instructions, including an order calling for drilling later today on the college athletic field.

"They've got to parade to meals, and they can't parade until they learn to march," said Captain Herbert W. Underwood, dour retired naval officer who must train the women volunteers to fill shore jobs that will release fighting men.

"I expect these young women to be a prize bunch of rookies, and I'm going to have some pretty good sailors before the month is over," Underwood added.

Hawley Pastor Resigns Pulpit

Reverend Schmidt To Preach Final Sermon

Reverend J. A. Schmidt, pastor of the Hawley Bible church and the Christian and Missionary Alliance for the past six years, will preach his farewell sermon Sunday morning. Reverend and Mrs. Schmidt and family will leave for Albert Lea, where he will found a new congregation.

Reverend Schmidt came to Hawley six years ago. For four weeks, meetings were held in a large tent. At that time, the tent was moved to Hitterdal, after which the Union Congregational building, Hawley, was leased and services held there.

Four years ago, the congregation decided to build a church. Three lots were donated and the project started. While the upstairs was being finished, services were held in the basement. The church was completed, and dedication exercises were held in June, 1941.

Much of the work was done by volunteer labor. The value of the building is about \$10,000. About two years ago, the congregation acquired a parsonage.
