

# Stage Set for Twins' First Home Game

## COLORFUL OPENING DAY CEREMONY TO BE HELD TUESDAY

MAYORS, BANDS OF TWO CITIES TO FIGURE IN CIVIC WELCOME TO TEAM.

League Leaders Play Wausau At 5:15 P. M. Tomorrow In Moorhead League Park.

An enthusiastic welcome on the part of Moorhead and Fargo baseball fans today awaited the homecoming of the Twins, who play Wausau in their first home game of the 1936 Northern league schedule at 5:15 p. m. tomorrow in Moorhead's league park.

Heading the league standings again after a see-saw weekend that saw them drop to third place and rise again to first, the Twins were idle today. They defeated Eau Claire, 7-5, in a 10-inning game Sunday after losing 6-0 to the Bears in Saturday's contest.

Line-up Mostly New Tuesday, the baseball machine that has decisively established itself as a power by defeating opponents in six games while losing three times in the first road trip of the season, will exhibit itself to Moorhead and Fargo fans for the first time in a regular game.

Presenting largely a new line-up, the Twins' debut also will mark the initial bow of Manager Harold Irelan before the Twins' local followers. Irelan took over the managerial post this season as the successor to Jack Knight.

Celebrating "opening day" and welcoming the Twins home, Moorhead and Fargo have arranged for a colorful ceremony to start the contest of Ken Kennedy will be master of ceremonies.

Mayors to Form Battery Mayors E. W. Humphrey of Moorhead and City Commissioner W. W. Fuller of Fargo will form the battery as the first ball is hurled across the plate—or, at least, in that vicinity. Then the regular Twin pitcher and catcher will take their places, a Wausau batter will step up to the plate and the 1936 season will be under way.

Meanwhile, bands from Fargo and Moorhead will play martial airs for several minutes preceding the game to set a musical stage for the Twins' initial appearance of the season.

By UNITED PRESS Fargo-Moorhead lost and regained first place in a hectic weekend of Northern league baseball. The Twins dropped clear to third place behind Jamestown and Eau Claire after losing to Eau Claire, 6 to 0, Saturday, only to climb into the league lead with a 10-inning, 7 to 5 win over the Bears yesterday.

Despite a 7 to 5 loss to Duluth Saturday, Jamestown slid into the front position on its percentage point basis. However, the Jimmies plopped back into second place when the Duluth Dukes again trimmed them yesterday, 3 to 2.

Meanwhile, Wausau defeated Crookston twice, 10 to 2 on Saturday, and 14 to 7 yesterday, and Winnipeg and Superior split a weekend pair, Winnipeg copping the Saturday contest 12 to 6 and Superior winning yesterday, 8 to 1.

Stemling Blanks Twins The Twins were helpless before the pitching of Whitey Stemling, Eau Claire pitcher, who chalked up his third win in four starts by setting down Fargo-Moorhead Saturday with seven hits, only one of which was made after the fourth inning. The Blues jarred Reese for 16 blows.

The Sunday contest was a battle all with Alexander's home run knocking the count for Fargo-Moorhead in the ninth. The Twins snatched Kelly freely in the 10th and scored a pair of runs to cinch the game.

Ade Stem's home run gave Duluth a pair of runs to sew up the game with Jamestown in the 11th frame. Both teams pounded the ball hard with the Jimmies collecting 10 sacrifices and the Dukes securing 15. Yesterday's game was a close defensive battle, with the Dukes coming out on top by a single count.

SCHWARTZ HORSE FIFTH IN HISTORY TO TRIUMPH IN DERBY, PIMLICO.

New York, May 18 (UP)—Morton L. Schwartz's Bold Venture, winner of both the Kentucky derby and the Preakness, will receive his final test of greatness when he faces both Brevity and Granville in the Belmont stakes, June 6.

The great three-year-old thundered into the stretch to nose out Granville in the Preakness Saturday, becoming thereby the fifth horse in history to capture both the Pimlico and Churchill features. Sir Barton, Gallant Fox, Burgo King and Omaha were the others.

The "bold one" was returned to his Belmont park quarters yesterday. Trainer Max Hirsch said that he would not ship the colt west for the Latonia derby next Saturday and that there was consequently a fare possibility that he would be entered in the Withers stake to compete with Brevity at Belmont stakes.

## STREAK OF 7 WINS PUTS GIANTS NEAR LEAD IN NATIONAL

8-6 DEFEAT OF PITTSBURGH LATEST IN STRING OF N. Y. VICTORIES.

Cardinals, Topping Standings By Half Game Margin, Tounce Phillies 10-3.

By LESLIE AVERY New York, May 18 (UP)—The New York Giants went after the St. Louis Cardinals' National league leadership today with a seven-game winning streak—the season's longest—powering their drive.

The New Yorkers haven't lost a game since May 9, when they were knocked over by the Philadelphia Phillies. That was the day that Manager Bill Terry went into the Giant lineup to replace Sam Leslie at first base. Terry has hit safely in every game since. The Giants have won two from the Phils, two from the Chicago Cubs and a pair from the Cincinnati Reds.

Yesterday Terry let Leslie go back to his position and directed the Giants' 8 to 6 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates from the coaching line.

Castleman in Win Column Clyde Castleman, who won 15 games while losing six for the Giants last year, finally broke into the 1936 win column yesterday as New York defeated Pittsburgh. He pitched only 2-2-3 innings, but he won on the mound when the Giants' three-run burst in the fifth clinched the victory.

The victory enabled the Giants to keep within a half game of the leading Cardinals, who pounded out a 10 to 3 decision over the Phillies off give Dizzy Dean his fifth victory of the year. Diz gave up only six hits.

Brooklyn's daffy Dodgers banged out a dozen hits but left 11 men stranded on the base paths and lost to the Cincinnati Reds, 3-2.

Chicago at Boston was rained out. In the American, the leading New York Yankees were held scoreless five innings by their old teammate, Johnny Allen, but in the sixth they unleashed a six-hit attack good for five runs, and went on to defeat the Cleveland Indians, 8 to 4. It was Lefty Gomez' fifth victory.

Rick Ferrell's ninth inning homer gave the second place Boston Red Sox an 8 to 7 decision over the Chicago White Sox.

The Detroit Tigers won out by the same margin, 6 to 7, over the Washington Senators, as a result of a two-run rally in the ninth.

St. Louis' Browns won out 8 to 5 over the Philadelphia Athletics as Elton Hoegsett, recently acquired from Detroit, became one of the few Brownie pitchers to go the full route this season.

## Twins' New Manager Has Long Record In Baseball

Irelan, Making Debut Here Tomorrow, Has 25 Years' Experience As Player, Manager, Owner, Scout For American Diamond Teams.

A frequent indictment against smaller minor league baseball clubs is that they fail to have men sufficiently versed in the practical side of the game to teach the young fellows under them what they should know.

But no such charge could be made against Harold (Grump) Irelan, new pilot of the Fargo-Moorhead Twins, who will make his "home" debut when the Twins meet Wausau at 5:15 p. m. tomorrow in the Moorhead league park. He has run the baseball gamut from A to Z.

He has been a manager, scout, club owner and club official, as well as player, and if there are a few tricks about baseball he does not know, they are few, indeed. As recently as 1934, he was vice-president and manager of the Des Moines club of the Western league.

Irelan started his playing career as a shortstop with Marion, Ind., in 1909, moved to Wabash in 1910 and Hopkinsville in 1911. The next year

he had a trial with the Phillies and was sent out to Sacramento in the Coast league, where he played for two years.

The Phillies sent for him to come back in 1915, and after another trial he went to Montreal, then Omaha, Mobile, Charlotte and numerous other way stations along the line.

The Twin pilot began managing at Kingsport in 1921. At Decatur in 1924, he began a long managerial stretch in the Three-I league. In 1928, under colors of the Indiana-Quincy club, he took over the club and ran it until the winter of 1930, when the Indians decided to pull out. He then got control of the franchise for himself and became a magnate.

Although Quincy was the sixth city in the Three-I in point of population, Irelan's teams were so attractive they led the loop in attendance in 1929 and 1931 and won two pennants for the city.

Picard's fine iron play will make him especially dangerous, as the Hershey star is also a fine putter and among the longer hitters. Sarazen, with his hunches working, is always a factor. It is about time also that Horton Smith, Runyan, Revolta or Cooper crashed through, considering their tournament records for the last few years.

These six stars have been among the better scorers for several years. They are not only fine golfers but they have hammered their mental attitudes into scoring moods from coast to coast. Which means they can stick to the job through 72 holes—a job few can handle under the constant pressure of concentration.

## 150 BOYS ELIGIBLE TO ENTER REGION TRACK MEET HERE

WINNERS IN FOUR DISTRICTS TO COMPETE AT M. S. T. C. SATURDAY.

Fergus Falls Cops Honors In Event On Dragon Field; Moorhead Places Third.

Approximately 150 western Minnesota high school athletes today were eligible to compete next Saturday in the Region Six track and field meet at Moorhead State Teachers college as the final preliminary to the state tournament.

In each of 13 events in four district meets held Saturday, including the District 23 competition at M. S. T. C. here, winners of first, second and third places qualified to enter this week's regional contest in Moorhead.

Fergus Falls garnered a total of 58 1/2 points to win first place in District 23, qualifying for 14 positions in the regional. Pelican Rapids finished second with 37 points. Moorhead high school, third with 22 1/2 points, qualified two men and its relay team for regional entry.

Three "Baby Dragons" Quality The State Teachers college high school collected 17 district points as three of its athletes won the right to go into regional competition. Detroit Lakes won 21 points; Perham, 18; Hitterdal, 12; Frazee, 4; Barnesville, 3, and Hawley, 2.

Ole Quamme of Pelican Rapids was high individual scorer, winning the shot put, 100-yard dash and broad jump. M. Charleston of Fergus Falls was second with firsts in the high hurdles and discus and third in the shot put.

Of Moorhead high school's district entries, John Williams won the low hurdles and John Gossie was third in the high hurdles to qualify for the regional. Moorhead's half-mile relay team was edged out of first place by Detroit Lakes but qualified to enter the regional meet.

Nelson of M. S. T. C. high school won the 440-yard dash and placed third in the 220, while that school's Grover was second in the discus and Hoag was third in the 880 to win regional positions.

Crosby-Ironton Favorites Simultaneously, district meets were held at three other cities in western Minnesota. Each event qualified 36 individuals and three relay teams for next Saturday's regional competition, assuring a field of at least 150 contestants.

Crosby-Ironton, which has won Region Six track honors almost yearly for several seasons, enters the 1936 event a favorite, while Brainerd also is expected to have a strong team. Districts 21, 22, 23 and 24 will be represented.

Alex J. Nemeck, Dragon athletic director, will be manager of the regional meet. Chet Gilpin, M. S. T. C. high school coach, who managed the Dragon Relays, May 9, and the district meet Saturday, will accompany the Dragon track team to the college conference at Mankato this week.
