MSTC QUINT FACES HAWLEY CAGE FIVE ON CRIMSON FLOOR

CONCORDIA REGISTERS 40 TO 21 WIN OVER BOTTINEAU IN OPENER.

Vernon Zehren, Fred Kellett Replace Dragon Veterans Lost By Graduation.

One Moorhead college basketball quint, the MSTC Dragons, is scheduled to open its season tonight while another local college team, Concordia, seeks its second victory of the season, the Cobbers having defeated Bottineau Foresters, 40 to 21, in their opening tilt Friday.

The Dragons, preparing for their first college opponent, the NDAC Bison, whom they face next Wednesday, battle the strong Hawley Hawks on the MSTC court at 8 tonight.

Concordia, opening its season with a jaunt into North Dakota, meets Minot Teachers at Minot.

Two Veterans Missing Coach Alex J. Nemeck expects a good workout from the aggressive Hawley team, which Friday night defeated the Fairmount Friendly Five team of Moorhead at Hawley, 32-30.

Two veterans are missing from last year's Crimson team. Ken Erickdahl and Vince Watchak. In their places Nemeck plans to use Vernon Zehren, southpaw forward, and Fred Kellett, Iron Mountain, Michigan, forward.

The veteran Orville Schwankl will pair with Zehren at forward. Sophomore Glen Preston is slated to hold down the center post with all-conference guard Bert Martin handling the remaining position.

Peinovich, Roos Star In the Cobbers opening victory of the year, it was the veteran Norman Roos, and a former Minnesota all-state center, Mike Peinovich, who paced the Maroon and Gold quint to an easy triumph.

Peinovich dropped in four field goals and three free throws to usurp high-scoring honors with eleven points. Roos tallied four times from the field. Curt Thompson registered three baskets.

Concordia held an advantage throughout the game, with a 17 to 6 lead at the half.

Clausnitzer, with seven points, paced the Forester attack.

CUNNINGHAM MILE TO BE ACCEPTED

RECORD OF 4:04 TO BE RECOGNIZED BY AAU CONVENTION MEMBERS.

Washington, Dec. 3 (UP)—Glenn Cunningham's 4:04.4 mile, fastest ever run by man, becomes an American record today as the A. A. U. convention goes through the formality of accepting the recommendation of the records committee.

Cunningham's performance around Dartmouth's track last March never will be recognized as a world standard, because the international amateur athletic federation does not list indoor marks.

His was one of 144 applications scanned by the record committee at the opening session yesterday when the track and field committee tabulated a proposal to abandon the metric measuring system and return to the linear inches, feet, yards and miles system. Great Britain was the only one of 48 members of the I. A. A. F. which banned the metric measurements.

The Spuds romped to an easy 36 to 17 victory over Pelican Rapids Friday at Pelican, taking an early lead and holding their advantage throughout the game.

Hawley, putting up a surprisingly strong fight, finally went down to defeat at the hands of Detroit Lakes Friday, 31 to 29, after a nip-and-tuck battle.

Use 12 Players. Coach Roy Domek used 12 Moorhead players with the scoring honors for the evening being well divided.

Roger Pitsenberger tallied four field goals, Pete Young, James Brenden and Bob Wicklund three each Paul Hanson, two, and Harold Erickson and Herb McArthur, one each. Erickson added two free throws.

Pelican Rapids was held to four goals from the field, with no Pelican player counting more than one basket. Westby scored five points and Grina and Swenson, four apiece. Nine of Pelican's points were on free throws.

Lead at Half. The Spuds led a 20 to 7 advantage at the half and frequent substitutions made the play ragged throughout, though the Spuds showed a promising effectiveness at times.

Hawley, in losing to the Lakers, lagged at the half, 16-13, and at the end of the third period, 25-33, after being tied at 8-all after the first eight minutes of play.

NEARLY 100,000 EXPECTED TO JAM STANDS TO WITNESS CLASSIC.

Notre Dame Protects Unbeaten Record; Southern Cal Fights For Prestige.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3 (UP)—In a football game that even the Hollywood press agents have to admit is tremendous, stupendous, and slightly colossal, the Trojans of Southern California meet the Irish of Notre Dame in Memorial coliseum today.

The game, which means so much to both teams, is certain to be watched by 95,000 spectators, and there is a good chance that every one of the coliseum's 101,000 seats will be occupied. With all the choice seats long sold, the scalpers did a brisk business among those customers willing to pay upwards of \$25 a pair.

13th in Series. Today's game, the thirteenth in a series, finds the glamorous Irish in Los Angeles with an unbeaten and untied team for the first time since Knute Rockne's mighty eleven of 1930. Already triumphant over Kansas, Georgia Tech, Illinois, Minnesota and Northwestern, a victory today would give the South Benders a new claim to the national championship of 1938.

But as important as the tilt is to the Irish, it is more vital to the men of Southern California. They literally have everything to gain and everything to lose, and it is a sure fire thing that they will shoot the wads of the Rose bowl by defeating the Irish who make their bowl appearance little more than a farce, and they will be out to uphold the prestige of that mammoth flower pot.

David Quiet Alumni. A victory over the Irish would wipe away the sting of the defeats the Trojans suffered at the hands of Alabama and Washington earlier in the year, and go a long way toward getting their coach, Howland Jones, a new contract. His position has been shaky all year, but not even the biggest wolf among the alumni could cry for the scalp of a coach whose team gave Notre Dame its lone defeat and also made the Rose bowl, with its \$100,000 in cash.

The betting odds have been unstable for a week, and they were unstable today. One price was offered here and another one there. By game time, however, they probably will have settled down. Jones and Jones is likely to take the field an 8 to 5 favorite. Hundreds of thousands of dollars will change hands after the game, because not for many years has Los Angeles seen such wagering on a football battle.
