Peet pointed out that the population of Clay county in round figures is approximately 23,000, of which about 11,000 are engaged in farm-

It was brought to the attention of Rotarians that about 2,400,000 bushels of potatoes are cultivated annually in the county, with an average cash return of 48 cents per bushel. Barley production totals 2,200,000 bushels, with an average return of 35 cents per bushel.

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
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
