

# FLIER STAYED IN CRAFT TO **CHECK CRASH**

Washington, July 26 (UP)—Lieut. C. C. Champion, naval flier who fell seven miles to safety after his engine exploded, stayed with his machine to keep it from falling into the business district of the capital, it was revealed
