

St. Paul, Sept. 17 (UP)—Delegates to the Minnesota convention of the American Federation of Labor act today on resolution,s including a proposal for modification rather than repeal of the state labor relations act.

Sixty resolutions were sent to the resolutions and legislative committees last night at the close of the first day of the convention. About two-thirds of the proposed resolutions dealt with legislative
